Heart to Heart

This is the story of a man who didn't believe in God. And he didn't hesitate to tell others how he felt. His wife, however, did believe, and she taught their children about God and Jesus.

One year, his wife and children were going to the Christmas Eve service at church. She asked him to come, but he refused. "The Christmas story is such nonsense!" he said. "Why would God leave heaven and come to earth as a man?" So, she and the children left, and he stayed home.

Nothing he did could get them to go into the barn, where they would be warm and safe. He thought about it for a time. "If only I were a goose," he said, "then I could save them."

Then an idea came to him. He went into the barn, got one of his geese and carried it in his arms. He circled around behind the flock of wild geese and released it. His goose flew through the flock and straight into the barn. And one-by-one, the other geese followed it to safety.

He stood silently for a moment, remembering the words he had spoken earlier: "If only I were a goose, then I could save them." And he

remembered what he had said to his wife. "Why would God want to be like us? That's ridiculous!" But suddenly, it all made sense. We were like the geese – blind, lost, perishing. So, God sent Jesus as a man, so he could show us the way and save us.

The man fell to his knees in the snow and prayed his first prayer: "Thank you, God, for coming in human form to get me out of the storm!"

UMW Special Mission Recognition

Since its inception in 1973 our United Methodist Women's Organization has presented a Special Mission Recognition Award. A total of 77 awards have been presented to date to deserving persons, both men & women, for their service to UMW, the church as well as in other areas.

The recipient for this year, Pastor Lynn Westover, was born in Texas. Since her parents were divorced, she and her brother lived with their mother. Her mother remarried and as a result she has a half-brother and a half-sister. Being the eldest she helped raise her siblings. A big job for a young person to do. Her father subsequently remarried resulting in Lynn having three half-sisters from that union.

Pastor Lynn graduated High School early and attended the University of Texas at Austin where she not only graduated but also was part of the school's marching band. If you watched college football you may have seen Lynn at half-time in the marching band.

One summer while attending Vacation Bible School, Lynn received Jesus Christ as her Lord and Savior. As a child she attended church on her own. At a young age she knew that God was calling her. God seemed to be pushing her into something more.

Following college she married a man that she had met while in the marching band and they had two girls. They separated and she began raising the girls. She felt the Lord calling her into Christian Service and started down the path to becoming ordained. This was very difficult but she was able to persevere and finally achieved her goal.

Going into Christian Service is a daunting job for anyone let alone a woman more than 35 years ago. Sometimes a church does not want a woman as a pastor and cannot be easy to work with. On the other hand other churches will receive a woman and be open to her as a Pastor.


While serving Trinity UMC in Lakewood she asked at a prayer meeting for laughter in her life as a Pastor. God granted her desire but in an unexpected way. Subsequently a man came into her life with whom she could serve the Lord. In 1998 she married Stan Westover.

She has been serving churches for about 35 years helping many people through tough times and sharing many joys over the years.

Lynn has served the First United Methodist Church of Canoga Park as its Pastor for 10 years and loves this congregation very much, and will miss all of you as she will be retiring in June.

Facilities Update for March

Irrigation system/Grass areas:

We will be investigating whether or not the DWP offers commercial users a way to set up a separate meter for irrigation, so we don't pay sewer charges on water that does not go down the sewer.

We ended up with extra dirt from the Eagle Scout project up and around the trees near the Preschool. We are currently working to determine where best to put the extra dirt.

We are still hopeful the Eagle Scout project along Maynard will be completed sometime in March.

Fountains:

The Maynard/Sherman Way Fountain was leaking again in early February and was off for a week or so while repairs were made.

Roofs:

We still need to address the roof leaks over the Women's restroom in the sanctuary buildings. With all the December rains our roofer has been totally overwhelmed with work so it will probably be another month or so before the fix is completed. Following the roof repair we will be working on all plaster and paint projects tied to the leaky roof. Money from the Capital Fund will be used to make these repairs.

The ADM COM met in early February to finalize the 2022 budget. We're going to set the budget by the end of February except for one major line item – Pastor Compensation. When Pastor Lynn leaves us at mid-year we will have a new Pastor appointed. Because Pastor Compensation is based on years of service we will not fully understand the actual compensation for the full year until later this spring. At that time we will insert those numbers and finalize the budget. As the budget looks right now we have a large deficit but we are hopeful that special one-time gifts, additional renters later in the year when Omicron subsides, and continued income from both the Endowment and Capital Fund will bridge the gap by year's end.

Jesus Christ puts us where we need to be.

This church is the second longest one I have been in. I walked into my first United Methodist Church in Ashland, Oregon. I was there for 14 years, from August 1997 til March 2011. It gave me a good foundation and a safe place to talk and heal. Church acquaintances turned into brothers and sisters in Christ. Much like the brothers and sisters in Christ here. I noticed that when I first came to this church. Cheryl Meadows from the First United Methodist Church of Reseda mentioned to me, when she found out I was moving to Woodland Hills, that there was a great Methodist Church there on Sherman Way, and a great pastor there as well. She was right on both accounts. She also mentioned to look for her friend Shirley Thomson.

The longevity of the people here are sisters and brothers. Even Maggie had that here. Though she was new when I first met her here, we clicked as sisters. Maggie knew people because she was here in this community teaching for 36 years! And I have that with others here as well.

We not only become sisters and brothers because of how long we have been here, I would say even more is what life puts in front of us. Like my bouts of cancer and hospital stays. When I was about to have my bladder removed, Chandra told me what it would be like, that was very kind and helpful. Tim O'Connor told me about radiation, which was also kind and helpful. You know you're not alone. Stan told me about what to expect from MRI's. We also share in the fact we both have shards of glass in our lungs. It makes it not feel so alone. Thank you Lynn, Stan, Roger and Nancy for conducting Bible study classes, sharing fellowship and learning how to have a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ through the Bible.

I was blessed to be part of Beulah's, Mervin's and Grace's shower ministry. By making pots of Bean soup, turkey chili and cornbread, as well as bringing socks and clothing for the homeless. Beulah, Mervin and Grace took care of Jesus's homeless children. They gave the showers, towels, clothes, food and a place to give thanks. I would not like to forget Santino, who was always there for the homeless men, watched out for the ladies and checked upon our church at night. I was grateful for when I couldn't make it to church due to healing from cancer operations and Covid isolation that Mary Mackay dropped off the Upper Room monthly booklets for me or Margaret mailed them. I use them everyday along with my Bible and my devotional books. I lean on them all week long. I am so grateful for all the hard work Pastor Lynn, Grant, Trish, Paul, Stan, Robert Lamb and Grace did making sure we were all able to have a meaningful church sermon on Youtube.

Paul's beautiful music and voice to sing along with (I even sounded good sometimes) made me feel like I was in church, a form of normalcy for us all.

My life has been anything but normal it seems in 2021. When my husband could no longer ignore the way he was feeling, he went to Urgent Care, where they told him he had Pneumonia. He went home with antibiotics for a week. He returned a week later as asked and was told he had to go to the hospital for his Pneumonia. He was there a couple of days when they did a CT Scan, because the doctors thought he should have been getting better. That was when we found out about his Kidney cancer and eventually about his lung cancer and that he would not be coming home. At the same time, my Leukemia was coming on strong because my medication was no longer working. I couldn't do anything about it until I had the

radiation done on my right lung. All the time my husband was declining daily. I held my husband's hand while he passed. The very next day I finished my last radiation treatment. I was emotional on the last treatment, I pulled myself together by praying (which I did through all my radiation treatments as well) This last one was no different. I couldn't have gone through all of this without Jesus Christ holding me up.

At this sad time for me and my family, again our Christ-driven church paid for my husband's cremation, offered a memorial service and the rose garden to put his ashes. I am humbled by Lynn and our church for the love and support and prayers.

In Memoriam

Charyl Ann Patterson 14 December 1944 – 18 December 2021

I met Charyl soon after I came in 2012 to serve this church as pastor. She welcomed and encouraged me with cards and notes. In the early days, I had no idea she had already lived at West Hills Health and



Rehab for years, because she did not dwell on this.

How would I describe Charyl?

Resilient – She was resilient. She adapted to living in an institution she called home for so many years.

Faithful – Charyl was a faithful disciple of Jesus Christ and a long-time member of this congregation. She loved God. Through it all, her faith never waivered. Charyl and her mother, Charlotte Schuster, were members of United Methodist Women for 45 years. Charyl received the UMW Quiet Disciple award in 1986-1987. This award is given to a person who exemplifies service to UMW in a quiet, unobtrusive way with a cheerful unassuming manner. She was just such an example!

Compassionate – Charyl was compassionate. The minute she knew someone was not feeling well, she sent prayers and a card.

Generous – Charyl was generous with compassion and her time. She sent cards for every occasion. Even though things were really difficult for her in these last few years, she kept those cards and poems coming. And she painstakingly signed every card she sent.

Grateful – Charyl was grateful for the card ministry that filled her life with purpose, as she remembered birthdays and anniversaries and encouraged people through illness and times of grief.

Busy – She had a small desk with an electric typewriter that she used to address the envelopes. She had the UMW and church directories handy as well as return address labels. Visitors would often find her sitting at the typewriter doing her cards.

Persistent - Although speaking was difficult for her, she didn't give up trying to make herself understood. Charyl was a talker stuck in a body that made communication difficult. But she never let that stop her. Talking, whether or not the listener understood what she was saying, was important to her. It was another way she stayed involved and shared what was on her mind.

Loving – Charyl always said I love you when saying goodbye.

Gutsy – I like this adjective. Charyl was a gutsy lady! This might be the reason the Apostle Paul's words from 2 Timothy 4:6 –8 come to mind as I remember Charyl. Paul says the time of his departure has come. He says, "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith."

Like the Apostle Paul, Charyl fought the good fight, she finished the race, she kept the faith. Now, she has gathered with the saints before the throne of God and of the Lamb, where the Lord God will be their light, and they will reign forever and ever.

Charyl's Life

Charyl was born on December 14, 1944 in Oak Park, Illinois. After her father contracted polio her family moved to Whittier, California in 1951 and later relocated to Woodland Hills in 1955 when her father got a job at Rocketdyne. They transferred their church membership from the First Methodist Church in Whittier to the First Methodist Church of Canoga Park.

Upon graduating from W.H. Taft High School Charyl went on to achieve an A.A. degree from

L.A. Pierce College. She spent many years working at The Broadway Department Store, first in the Notions Dept. and later worked at the Billing Office in Los Angeles. Charyl loved doing beautiful thread embroidery and liquid embroidery until it became too difficult for her to do. She won blue ribbons for her liquid embroidery.

Charyl married Ted Patterson in 1972, unfortunately the marriage didn't last. Charyl remained active within the church. She was a member of various UMW groups. When her health issues with Ataxia worsened it became harder for her parents to take care of her. At her doctor's suggestion she was placed in West Hills Health and Rehab where she could get the care she needed. She remained there for 20 years.

Charyl never let any of the obstacles or health issues she had diminish her faith. She was always the first person to send out a get well card when she heard of someone being ill and she never missed a birthday or anniversary. She loved the time she spent being a sunshine person for the UMW at church. She loved God, her Family, her Friends and her Church Family. She passed away on December 18, 2021. She will be missed.

Her brother Bob and his family wish to thank all those that supported and helped her throughout the years. The family suggests that any donations be made in her memory to the Ataxia Foundation.
